Baby Names 2019

Each year, the states and territories around Australia reveal the top names given to babies in the previous year.

Analysing baby names at any point in history paints an interesting picture of that era. The Builders generation (born before 1945) chose traditional names such as Peter, Paul, John, Karen, Jennifer or Sharon.

Jump to the 1980's, when the Baby Boomers began to be more creative with their names. This was around the time when baby name books started to emerge.

Today's parents have more access to information than any other time in history. Parents are inundated with options, research and meaning, all impacting the names they choose for their children.

A name today is more than what teachers will call you at school. It is your digital real estate in an increasingly technological world.

In 2018, there were just over 300,000 babies born in Australia. Around one in ten Australian newborns were given one of the top ten baby names.

Charlotte and Oliver maintain their reign

Charlotte, the name given to 1,673 Australian baby girls in 2018, has been crowned the number one baby name since overtaking Olivia in 2015.

Oliver, the name given to 2,134 Australian baby boys in 2018, has enjoyed an uninterrupted six years at the top spot since overtaking Jack in 2013.

Compared across Australia



Oliver topped the list across Australia again in 2018. The only exception is in the Northern Territory, where Jack took first place and, in the ACT, where William took first place.

The top five boy names were more varied across the states and territories in 2018. Harrison and Charlie only appeared in the top five in South Australia. Leo only appeared in the Western Australian top five. Mason only appeared in



the Tasmanian top five, while Alexander and Michael only appeared in the top five in the Northern Territory.

The top five girl names were also more varied in 2018. Charlotte only topped the list on five of the eight states and territories. Olivia topped the Victorian list for the first time since 2015, Ava topped the Western Australian list and Amelia topped the ACT list.

When comparing the top five Australian baby names with other English-speaking countries around the globe, each Australian name in the top five is also on the New Zealand, USA, UK and Canadian lists. The only exception is Henry, who is not featured on the international top five lists.

The Australian top five list is most like the UK list (England and Wales). Four out of the five girls' names feature on both the Australian and UK list, and three out of the five boys' names feature on both lists.



For boys, Leonardo (96th) made its first entrance into the top 100 in the modern era. Other traditional boy names also entered the 2018 Top 100 such as Maxwell (85th) and Christian (92nd).

For girls, Adeline (82nd) also made a grand entrance into the top 100 in the modern era. Thea (77th) also entered the 2018 list, following a more traditional theme.

Over the last two years, the boy's name Carter experienced the biggest boost up the list, climbing 17 places, now at 52nd position. Carter's boost in popularity could be attributed to American pop-culture royalty, Jay Z (Shaun Carter) and Beyoncé Knowles-Carter.

Louis jumped 14 places since the birth of Prince Louis in 2018, now at 59th position.

Luna has experienced an unprecedented boost in popularity. Luna entered the top 100 for the first time in 2017, debuting at 83rd and jumped another 21 spots in 2018 to 62nd position.

As we approach the end of the 2010s, we can see the names that stood the test of time.

Since 2010, Leo jumped an incredible 84 positions. Currently at 7th position, Leo has now entered the top ten for the first time in the modern era.

George jumped 44 positions between 2010 – 2018, now at 34th position. This could be attributed to Prince George's birth in 2013, who is third in line to the British throne.

Sofia jumped 41 positions between 2010 – 2018, now at 46th position. This could be attributed to Sofia Vergara, a famous American-Colombian actress whose popularity spiked when Modern Family first aired in September 2009.

Top names in recent decades

Jessica

Jessica was Australia's most popular girls name for 16 years from the mid 1980's to the early 2000's. In the mid 1990's, approximately one in every 30 girls born in Australia was named Jessica.

Less than 20 years after it was at number one, Jessica did not even make it into the top 100 in 2018.

Joshua

From the mid 1990's until 2003, Joshua was the most popular boys' name in Australia.

Not since the dominance of David in the 1960's or Michael in the 1970's has a boy name had such a popular run. However, since then, the popularity of Joshua has been consistently falling. In 2018, Joshua was ranked at 34th.

60 years of change

Baby name analysis tells a fascinating story about times in history. Below is analysis of the top baby names over twenty-year increments.

The royal influence

The British Royal Family continue to capture the hearts of Australians. From the moment Kate Middleton stepped out of the carriage on her wedding day onto the steps of Westminster Abbey, the 'Kate Effect' was born.

Beyond Kate, the extended royal family are not just influencing the fashion and hairstyle choices of modern Australians, but also their choice of baby names.

Prince George (born 2013) and Princess Charlotte (born 2015) have significantly contributed to the popularity of these names.

In the five years since Prince George was born, George's rank in the baby name list jumped 37 places. George now sits at 34th position.

When Princess Charlotte was born in 2015, her name overtook Olivia as the most popular baby name, it has remained undefeated to this day.

Unsurprisingly, since the birth of Prince Louis in 2018, his name has gained a boost in popularity. Louis has jumped 14 places since 2017, now at 59th position.

Before the birth of Harry and Meghan's baby in May 2019, Archie was already a popular name (29th), up four places since 2017 and Harrison was even more popular (12th), up one place on the previous year. Not only will these names see a boost, but Harry (16th, and 2nd in the UK) and Meghan (yet to enter the Top 100), are also likely to rise in the years ahead.



Parents opting for uniqueness

Compared to previous decades, parents in the 2010s have been opting for more creative choices for their children's name. This is evident when looking back just one generation, when the first-time mothers of today (average 31 years old) were born.

In 1987, 22% of babies born in NSW were given one of the top 10 baby names. Today, just 10% of babies were given one of the top 10 baby names. This is more significant when

considering there were over 5,000 more babies born in NSW in 2018 compared to 1987, yet fewer occurrences of the top 10 names.

When looking back another 30 years, in 1957, 30% of babies born in NSW were given one of the top ten baby names. This means, just over sixty years ago, there were almost 12,000 less babies born annually in NSW, but parents were three times more likely to give their baby a name in the top 10.

Parents today have far more access to names compared to those of previous generations. It was in the 1980s when baby name books started to emerge, and baby name lists were compiled. Prior to this, baby names were influenced by family traditions and religious persuasion.

Since the internet emerged, there has been an explosion of blogs, websites and even baby naming apps. Baby name websites include not only baby name lists, but also baby name search engines. Such websites allow you to not only find a name but search the history of that name and suitable sibling name options. They often include a comment section where people around the globe can share their opinion or experience of that name.

We are now aware of more than just the names we grew up with. Beyond just Australian names, baby names today are increasingly global.

What drives this desire to be unique?

The average first-time-parents of today were born in or approaching the early 1990s. These parents are likely to have grown up with several Matthew's, Chris', Sarah's and Jessica's in their class. In today's digitally connected world, your name is more than what your teacher calls you. Your name is now your social media handle, your personal brand and your web domain.


Increasingly, there is a trend to name one's child something that won't end up as SarahSmith205 on social media. Names are now considered as digital real estate in an increasingly global era.

Gendered names

Only one name in the Top 100 appears on both the girls' and boys' list in its unchanged form – **Charlie**. (85th for girls and 14th for boys).

While most names on the top 100 are more distinctly boys' or girls' names, several girls' names from the top 100 can be interchanged for boys' names. Some examples of these names include Harper (8th), Frankie (44th), Billie (66th), and Mackenzie (54th).

In similar fashion, parents are increasingly using popular boys' names when naming their daughters – names such as Riley, Dylan, Jordan, Luca, Ashton, Kai, Bailey and Jesse.





A botanical flare

Parents continue to use the botanical theme as a source of naming. This can be seen in names like Willow (10th), Ivy (18th), Lily (22nd), Violet (39th), Poppy (41st), Daisy (47th), Rose (56th), Jasmine (63rd), and Olive (79th).

Of the top five girls' names that most significantly increased in popularity in the 2010s, three had a botanical theme. From 2010 to 2018, Willow increased 64 positions, now sitting at 10th position. Violet increased 53 positions (now at 39th position) and Ivy increased 43 positions (now at 18th position).

In contrast, no Top 100 boys' names have botanic influences.



Quirky trends

There is Adam (75th) but no Eve, although there is Eva (37th).

There is a Bonnie (84th) but no Clyde.

Levi (20th) and Zara (31st) are some of the famous brands who also made the list.

Victoria was ranked 67th in New South Wales, yet ranked 89th in the state of Victoria.

Celebrities with both names on the list

Alice (36th) Cooper (26th)

Ruby (16th) Rose (56th)

Hamish (79th) Blake (90th) has both of his names on the top 100, with his wife Zoe (11th) and child, Sonny (80th) also featuring in the Top 100. Blake and Zoe's daughter's name Rudy didn't make it into the top 100

Biblical names in the Top 50

Just 2 names in the girls list: Chloe (9th) and Abigail (33rd)

But 14 names in the boys list: Noah (4th), Thomas (6th), James (9th), Ethan (11th), Alexander (13th), Elijah (19th), Levi (20th), Isaac (27th), Samuel (28th), Jacob (32nd), Benjamin (33th), Joshua (36th), Eli (49th) and Daniel (50th).

Single Syllable names in the Top 100

Only 4 names in the girls list: Grace (7th), Rose (56th), Claire (76th) and Quinn (78th).

But 14 names in the boys list: Jack (2nd), James (9th), Max (21st), George (34th), Finn (41st), Kai (53rd), Flynn (64th), Nate (67th), Luke (68th), Charles (74th), Beau (78th), Jake (86th), Blake (90th) and Jude (95th).

Names ending in a vowel or 'y' in the Top 20

17 of the 20 names in the girls list:

Charlotte (1st), Olivia (2nd), Amelia (3rd), Ava (4th), Mia (5th), Isla (6th), Grace (7th), Chloe (9th), Zoe (11th), Ella (12th), Matilda (13th), Emily (14th), Sophie (15th), Ruby (16th), Isabella (17th), Ivy (18th) and Evie (19th).

Only 5 of the 20 names in the boys list: Henry (5th), Leo (7th), Charlie (14th), Harry (16th) and Levi (20th).
