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Trends in Gen Alpha names

Each year Australia's states and territories publish the top names given to babies in the previous year. McCrindle then collates this data, analyses it, and discerns the nation-wide trends.

Analysing baby names at any point in history paints a fascinating picture of that era. The Builders generation (born before 1945) chose traditional names such as Peter, Paul, John, Karen, Jennifer, or Sharon for their children. In the 1980s, the Baby Boomers began drawing on baby name books for inspiration and trends. Meanwhile, today's parents, Generation Y (also known as the Millennials), are not only choosing new and different names but are also parenting a new and unique generation – Generation Alpha.

Generation Alpha describes the generation born since 2010 – the most digital, global, and visual generation on the planet. When they have all been born (2025), they will number almost two billion – the largest generation in the history of the world

Oliver and Charlotte top the ranks

Oliver continues its place as the most popular boys name for over a decade and is the most popular name overall in Australia by a significant margin. In fact, it is the only name on both lists to have over 2,000 occurrences. After falling to second place in 2021, Charlotte makes its way back to the top as Australia's most popular name for baby girls.



Trends in Gen Alpha names

The data highlights that some names have maintained their popularity, while some have become even more common, and others have begun to phase out.

- Classic names are still popular for baby boys and girls
- Shorter names are more common for boys
- Unique spelling and variations are trending, as parents look for distinctive ways to make traditional names stand out
- Gender-neutral names are becoming increasingly popular

Generation Alpha refers to the current generation of children who began being born in the year 2010. Children of Millennials, and often the younger siblings of Generation Z, there are more than 2.8 million of this generation born globally every week.

Why we decided to name them Generation Alpha

Over a decade ago, it became apparent to Mark McCrindle that a new generation was about to commence, and there was no name for them. So, the McCrindle team tested what Australians thought the next generation should be called. Many suggested Generation A, having come to the end of the alphabet with Generation Z. Generation Alpha, however, represents a whole new generation, born in a new century. Going back to the beginning didn't feel right for this next generation.

So, in keeping with this scientific nomenclature of using the Greek alphabet in lieu of the Latin and having worked through Generations X, Y and Z, it was settled on the next cohort being Generation Alpha – not a return to the old, but the start of something new.

Generic labels rather than descriptive ones are likely to last. A label like Generation X, Generation Z or Generation Alpha provides a blank canvas on which a generation can create their own identity, rather than having a descriptive label, relevant for just a segment of the cohort or for a period of time pinned on them.

This generation are the first to be entirely born in the 21st century. They are not a return to the old, but the start of something new. Using this reasoning and drawing on the scientific nomenclature of turning to the Greek alphabet, we decided to name them Generation Alpha.

such screen saturation during their formative years. From shorter attention spans to the gamification of education, increased digital literacy to impaired social formation, Generation Alpha is the first generation to be entirely born in the 21st century.

A positive outlook for their future

Generation Alpha are being shaped in different times to generations past. They are more digital, global, mobile, social, and visual than any generation before them. There's no doubt that Generation Alpha will come up against their own challenges, storm clouds, and uncertainty. Their future, however, is bright, and like every other generation, they will find the tools they need to thrive in it.

The future for Generation Alpha is exciting – full of creativity, innovation, and opportunity. They're not only following the positive examples set by older generations, but are also empowered to take action, stand up for what they believe in, and pave a new way forward.

Oliver continues decadelong run on top

Oliver tops the most popular boys name in Australia for the tenth year in a row. Oliver is also the most popular name overall – the only name to occur over 2,000 times in 2022.

Theodore makes its debut in the top ten for the first time after consistently climbing the ranks every year since joining the top 100 in 2014. In doing so, Lucas and Thomas end their streak of being in the top ten for over a decade.

Charlotte back on top

Charlotte reclaims the top spot as the most popular girls name in 2022 after being knocked off by Isla in 2021. Olivia continues her streak in the top ten, having been one of only three names (Charlotte, Olivia and Mia) to have featured in the top 10 since 2010.

Unlike the boys, there are no new additions to the top ten girl names in 2022, though the order did have a shakeup in rankings.

Top 100: Trends for boys

The top 100 list of baby boy names is largely made up of names that have remained popular for decades, such as William (#4), Henry (#5), James (#16), Harry (#18), and George (#25).

Traditionally Christian names are still quite common in Gen Alpha boys, with names like Noah (#2), Thomas (#11), Levi (#13), Elijah (#15), Isaac (#35), Samuel (#43), and Ezra (#57) found throughout the top 100.

When it comes to boys' names, short names are more popular. Out of the top 100 names, 86 are made up of only one or two syllables.

- One-syllable names: Jack (#6), Max (#20), Kai (#28), Finn (#38), Beau (#48)
- Two-syllable names: Noah (#2), Leo (#3), Henry (#5), Hudson (#8), Charlie (#9)

In the top 20, only William, Theodore, and Alexander have more than two syllables – names that are likely to be shortened to Will, Theo, and Alex, in true Aussie fashion.

While there hasn't been a significant shakeup in the most popular boys names, look out for these up and coming names for Gen Alpha boys:

Top 100: Trends for girls

Like the boys, many classic girl names feature in the top 100. Traditional names like **Charlotte** (#1), **Amelia** (#2), **Matilda** (#7), **Isabella** (#15) and **Scarlett** (#32) are spread throughout the list.

It is likely that The Royal Family (and popular shows like Bridgerton and The Crown) continue to inspire more regal names for girls, with noble-associated names growing in popularity in recent years.

Where parents of Gen Alpha boys opted for shorter names, parents of baby girls are more open to longer names such as **Sienna** (#18), **Violet** (#26), **Mackenzie** (#57), **Harriet** (#64), and **Aaliyah** (#88). Thirty of the top 100 names have three or more syllables.

Increasingly popular gender-neutral names

Across the top 100 for both boys and girls, gender-neutral names are becoming increasingly popular, with names like Charlie, Riley, Jordan, Jesse, Casey, Morgan, Jamie, and Taylor spread throughout the list. This reflects a cultural shift in Millennial parents, breaking down traditional gender norms often found in the naming process.

Boy/girl variations are becoming a trend

In addition to gender-neutral names, it is becoming more common for a traditionally boy or girl name to be spelled differently for their child.

International names reflecting a multicultural society

Many of the most popular names for are originally rooted in another ethnic culture. Out of the combined top 200 names, at least 89 can

be traced to having come from a non-English background, ultimately reflecting Australia's increasingly culturally diverse population.

Traditionally English names are still very much popular in Australia, such as Jack (#6), William (#4), James (#16), and George (#25). The three fastest-growing boy names over the last decade, however, are non-English (Luca, Leo, and Hugo). Other names that have made big leaps in recent years include Kai (#28 in 2022, #55 in 2017, #61 in 2012) and Ezra (#57 in 2022, only joining the top 100 in 2019).


Similar trends are seen for girl names, though not to the same extent as boys. Freya,

originating from Scandinavia, ranked #44 in 2022 and has jumped 22 spots from #66 in 2017; Remi, originally French, ranked #47 in 2022 and was still outside the top 100 until three years ago; Ava, not a stranger to the top ten, originated from Latin roots.

When considering the list of multicultural names, girls are more likely to have a Latin-rooted name, while boy names seem to have a more culturally diverse origin.

New additions to NSW's top 10

For the baby boys, Luca and Charlie join NSW's top ten for the first time. While for the girls, Sienna and Willow make their debut.

Classic names are still popular

The traditional boy and girl names appear prominently on this list. Gen Alpha parents in NSW have chosen the likes of Oliver, William, Henry, Charlotte, and Olivia – the tried and tested names that have been popular for generations.

Short and sweet for the boys

Reflecting the national trend, one or two-syllable names are common for baby boys in NSW. Even the longer names are likely to be nicknamed – Oliver ('Ollie'), William ('Will'), Theodore ('Theo'), and Thomas ('Tom').

'A' and 'L' are common

Parents of Gen Alpha girls seem to have a preference for names that end with an 'A', such as Amelia, Sienna, and Mia. Similarly, these parents also prefer a strong 'L' in the name of their babies, as reflected in Luca, Leo, Willow, and Ella.

Victorian parents consistent in their choice

In Victoria, Oliver remains the top name for boys for the fifth year in a row, while Charlotte reigns at the top for the third year in a row.

New additions to the top ten

Theodore finally cracks the top ten list, climbing all the way from #33 in 2018, #17 in 2020, #14 in 2021 and #8 in 2022. Hazel has made a similar journey, making its way from #32 in 2018, #21 in 2020, #16 in 2021 and #10 in 2022.

Short and sharp for the boys

Victorian parents prefer short names for their boys, such as Jack and Leo, as well as those heavy on the first syllable, like Henry, Charlie, Thomas, and Hudson.

Simple and elegant names for the girls

Parents of Gen Alpha girls have chosen names that are rather easy to pronounce for their daughters and feature a prominent 'A', such as Isla, Mia, and Ava.

Classic names feature heavily in QLD

Parents in Queensland are following the national trend of choosing classic names for their boys, such as Oliver, William, and Henry. In the same way, they've also given their daughters timeless names like Amelia, Charlotte, and Matilda.

Two-syllable selection

Many of the names on this list for boys and girls are two-syllabled, such as Oliver, Noah, Henry, Charlie, Ava, and Mia. Two-syllable names are often easy to say and remember, making them popular choices for parents.

Queensland boys are vowel-heavy

Queensland parents prefer a strong vowel, particularly the 'O' sound, in naming their boys, as found in Oliver, Noah, and Leo.

Rising ranks in SA

Archie, Luca, and Matilda cracked the top ten most popular names in South Australia for the first time. For Luca, it has been a relatively quick rise, leaping up the ranks from #52 in 2018 to #8 in 2022, while for Matilda, it has been a slow and steady journey, going from #19 to #17, #13, #12 and finally hitting #8 in 2022.

Oliver reigns as the top name for baby boys for another year, while Isla narrowly beats Charlotte.

Old-fashioned names in fashion

In South Australia, parents prefer giving their children old-fashioned names, such as Henry, Archie, William, Charlotte, Olivia, and Matilda – indicating a trend that vintage is still in vogue.

'A's all around

Tasmania full of Grace

Tasmania is the only state where **Grace** tops the list of the most popular girl names. It's also the only state to feature **Elsie** in their top ten list.

Classical names remain popular

Tassie parents still appreciate the classics, commonly naming their children Oliver, Henry, George, Charlotte, and Harper.

Nature-inspired names

In addition to the classics, baby girls in Tasmania are still very much inspired by nature, reflected in Willow, Hazel, and Daisy being extremely popular.

Names ending in 'y' and 'ie'

Parents in Tasmania seem to really appreciate names ending in 'y' and 'ie', such as Archie, Charlie, Elsie, Henry, and Ruby.

In comparison to the other states and territories, WA has the most top ten debutants in 2022. Lily, Ivy, Mila, Theodore, Henry, Levi, and Luca were all introduced to the top ten for the first time.

WA likes it short and sweet

The short and sharp names are quite popular out west, with only four of the top names having more than two syllables.

Biblical boy names

Western Australia is giving the City of Churches and SA a run for their money, with many of the most popular boys names being traditionally rooted in Christianity, including Noah, Thomas, Levi, and James.

'L' and 'A' for the girls

The most popular girl names in WA are heavy on the 'L' and 'A' sounds. Parents in WA also appreciate an elegant name, with most of the girl names tending to finish with a vowel.

Short and sharp


